The one time the sound tract got bad was when one of those senior class meetings was flashed on the screen. There was a great deal of noise but let's blame that on the projector. Our able president, Bil Hooper, with the assistance of vice president, Bob Hodgson, did his best to keep order; and Mary Frances McKiy, as secretary and treasurer, tried to keep her hair from turning grey over the finances.

The next flash showed the Stuckey twins enacting the dagger scene from Mrs. West's ever famous Macbeth. We wonder if that book will ever be taken from English Literature—certainly not at B. C. H. S.

One scene that some of us might have liked to cut out was the one showing almost the entire class playing hookey in order to bid some of our boys goodbye at the bus. Miss Hinton probably wondered what happened to her bookkeeping class that day. We gave to Uncle Sam—Dan Hinterliter, Bert Isaacson, Bil Hooper, Roy Adams, Julius and Julian Stuckey.

The colonial setting of the Junior-Senior banquet resulted in some lovely scenes. We especially enjoyed the singing of Mrs. Smith's troop of plantation darkies and the graceful, stately movements of the Virginia Reel. The negro waiters moving among the tables serving delicious southern food, the soft moonlight, the beautiful rock garden, the hanging moss, all produced a scene of beauty that will long linger in our memories.

As the end of the picture flashed on the screen showing the entire class in cap and gowns graduating from Baldwin High, I realized we would all remember the years we spent in B. C. H. S. as the most pleasant ones of our life. We hope the pictures of the future classes will be as entertaining to them as ours has been to us.

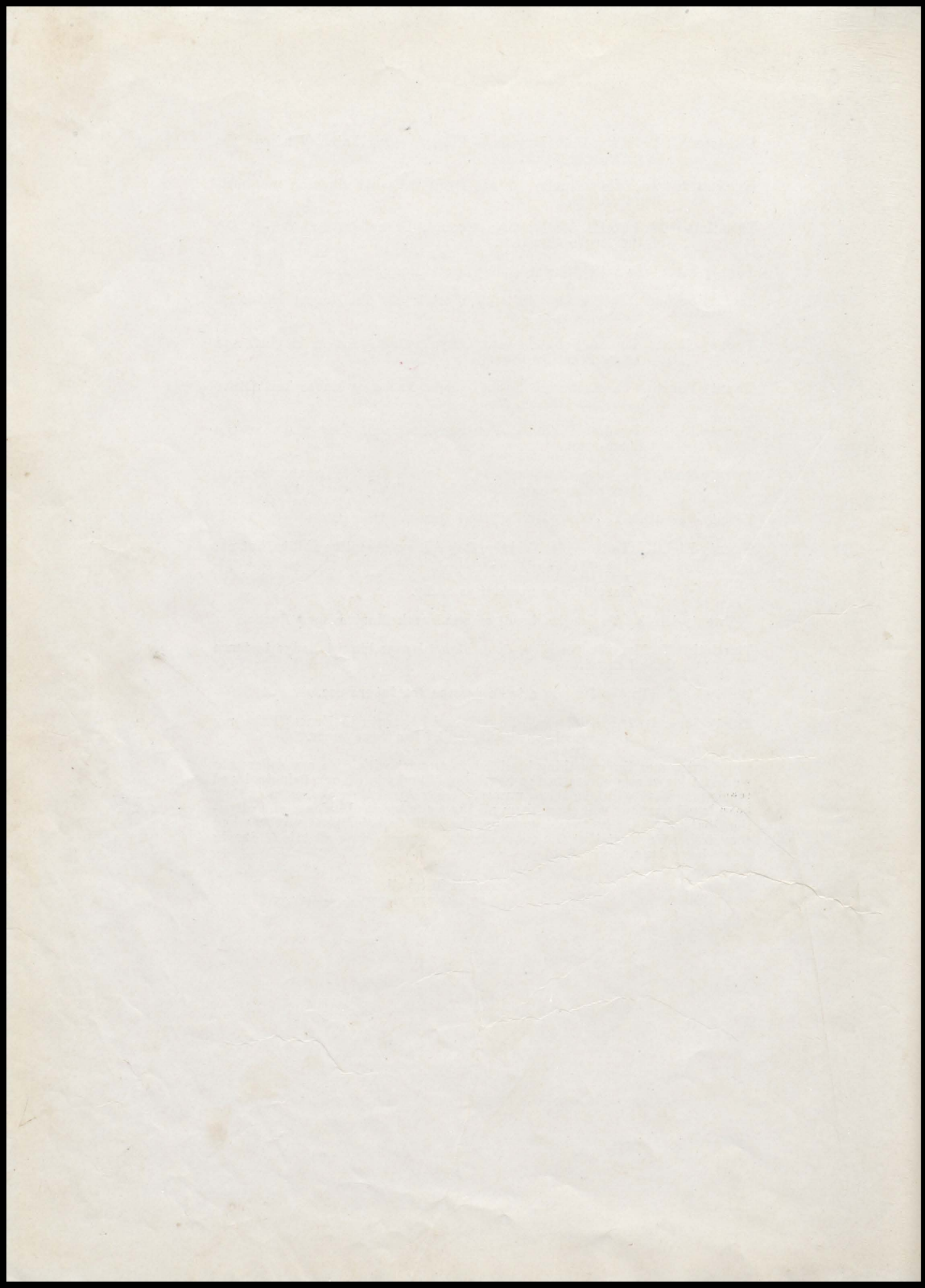
Listen, then, one and all, while I read the document, as duly drawn up and sworn to:

 - Seventeenth To anyone who needs it, Olene Morris' wills her hope that somebody she will grow.

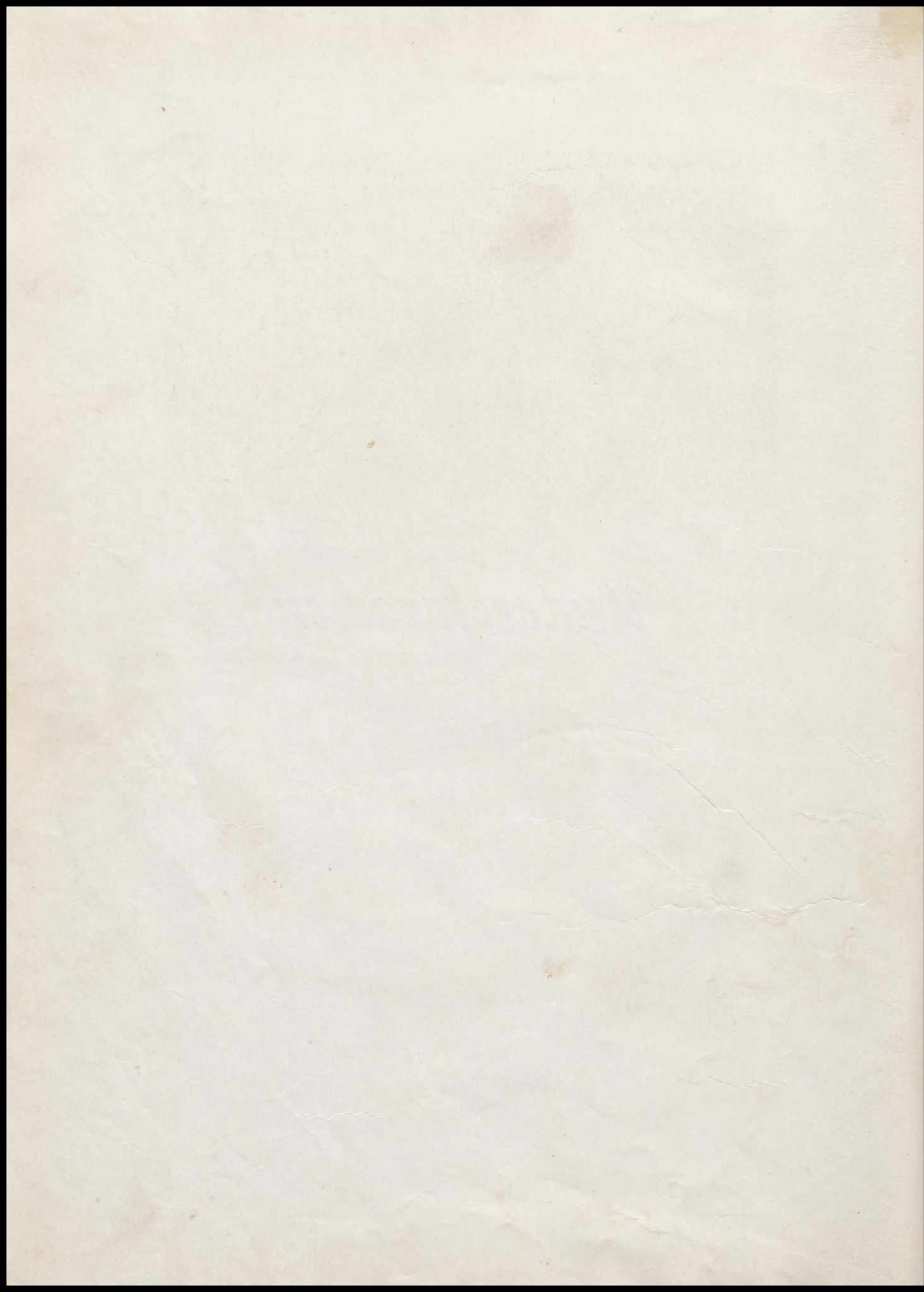
- Eighteenth To Mary Hall, Minnie McKinley's wavy hair. We hope she doesn't get sea-sick.

The team invaded Robertsedale and soundly defeated them. The day was hot and the casualties many, but the Tigers fought every play and finally overcame the opponent.

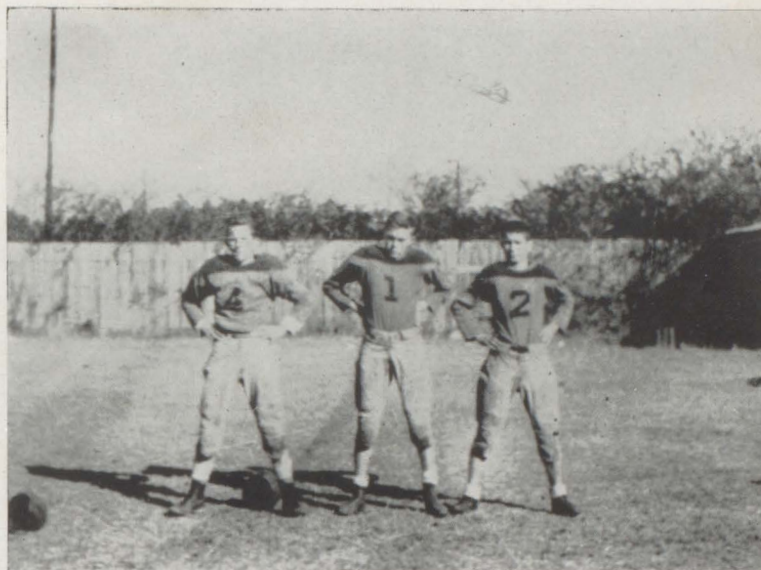

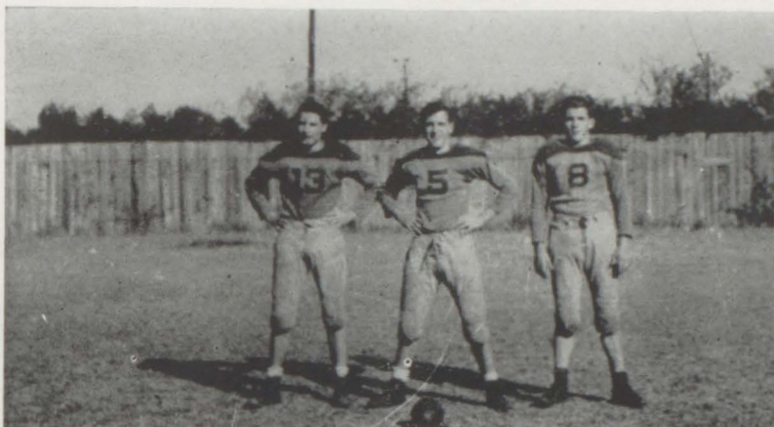
