


The Student Council held several dances, but the main project of the council was the laws governing the halls during the changing of periods. This project worked very well because the students cooperated completely.



elected secretary.


At the last meeting officers were elected for 1953-54. The next president is to be Buddy Prine. Morgan Little was chosen to be Editorin-chief of the Balcoala.

year in 53-54.




























### CAMERA CLUB

The club had a successful year under the leadership of their president Morgan Little, vice-president, Neal Presley; secretary, Carolyn White; treasurer, Patty White.


For the past year the club chose as its project learning how to develop photographs. The club met two nights a month in Miss Leonard's room to use her darkrooms.


At the end of the year the Camera Club always held a contest in which every member was supposed to participate. The bulletin board of the stackroom was chosen as the place to exhibit the photographs.

Each member was required to take their own picture, after choosing an original subject. They also had to develop their own pictures and enlarge them if they wished them enlarged.


Morgan Little was official photographer for the annual and his work in the Camera Club came in "handy".

Mr. Adolphus Jones was the D. O. co-ordinator for the past year.















Virginia Gay.






Just what does F. H. A. stand for? Future Homewreckers of America? No, Future Homemakers of America. This club is made up of girls from the home economics classes.

Their aim is to learn more methods of managing their "future" homes.




# "B" CLUB




#### B. C. H. S. - ROBERTSDALE










# TENNIS

We should have a good team next year if the boys work hard. Letters will be awarded in '54 for tennis.

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
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
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
